NEW TRAINING FACILITY

GRIFFITHS HIRE SHOPS have moved their in-house training facility from their Wrexham branch to new premises on Maes-y-Clawdd Industrial Estate in Oswestry.

They have been providing construction related training such as IPAF and PASMA for customers and their own staff for

many years and seen the demand for this training increase.

Popular courses include training operatives on the safe use of access equipment such as mobile elevated platforms (scissors lifts and cherry pickers) and mobile scaffold towers.

Having such a comprehensive standalone facility, large classroom and practical training area of 1600 square metres, it is expected that the

range of courses available will continue to expand.

Also, this training facility will be available for hire for those businesses wishing to organise their own training.



Improved Festival Square to meet town needs is the aim of new Feasibility Study

Oswestry BID has been awarded grant funding from the UKSPF (UK Shared Prosperity Fund) to complete a Feasibility Study on the best way forward for Festival Square.

BID have been working with Environmental Associates on this Feasibility Study, to engage with businesses and the public to really understand the town's needs and wants for Festi-

val Square, consider the possibilities, and develop a series of possible designs.

After a public stall on the square presenting options and inviting discussions, the study set up an online survey providing access for any business or resident wishing to comment.

Many took the opportunity to offer their thoughts and ideas on the options

online.

Clearly, any such functional or aesthetic changes to Festival Square must look to serve the town as a whole.

Environmental Associates are assessing the feedback to prepare a final report showing how the design elements were received, and offering possibilities for the future shaping of the area.

SECURITY PATROLS **SEE REDUCTION** IN ESTATE CRIME

Security Patrols check over 125 BID businesses premises three times a night, on the industrial estates, Whittington Road, Gobowen Road and Oswald Road playing a significant part in reducing commercial crime.

patrols on the induspatrols on the industrial estates in Oswestry have proven to be very effective, a positive reduction in calls has been seen, and I'm keen to see the patrols continue."

BID are presently looking to secure additional funding from the PCC (Police & Crime Commis-sioner) with a view to extending security patrols into the town centre, to provide nightly coverage of premises and the reporting of any suspicious activity.

The patrols continue to handle any security issues that arise, and provide regular Security Reports through the BID to each business.

Relaunched Shopwatch supported by Police and reducing retail crime



Shopwatch iniative has been relaunched in the face of a noted increase in shoplifting and anti-social behaviour, in and around town centre retail premises.

Shopwatch memincluding several independents and nationnow meet als. regularly with Police to discuss the situation on the

various mitigations and hear updates on how to support Police work.

The Police are fully committed to making a real difference to the level of retail crime, and recent weeks have seen a series of arrests and charges made.

Oswestry BID are also actively looking to secure funding for an Oswestry Street Rangers service in

the town centre to support the shops in handling shoplifting and related issues. The Rangers would also provide information to visitors, deal with anti-social behaviour and support the Police when required. Watch the space.

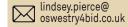

Five Top Business Tips from our Business Mentor, Fran Riseley



Have a look to see if there's anything useful you might implement in your business...

ONE Remind customers that you exist.

People need to hear a message at least 6 times before it registers. So use all your platforms to remind your customers about what you offer. Track your business by main sales area or department.

You will notice earlier an area of your business that is doing well that needs more space, or stock, or better marketing to let it grow.

THREE Sort your monthly expenses into descending order by value.

Then you can look at each one in turn and try to reduce them or negotiate a better deal or do without them.

FOUR
Keep a log of when
your contracts with
key suppliers run
out.

Then you can look at your broadband, or electricity or whatever it is a month before your contract runs out and find a better deal.

FIVE Involve your team.
